IMPORTANT NOTE: New Jersey Stormwater Management Regulations and Borough Ordinance 05-24-R, states that BRUSH, LEAVES OR VEGETATIVE WASTE MAY NOT BE PLACED WITHIN 10' OF A DRAINAGE INLET OR IN THE ROADWAY NO MORE THAN 7 DAYS PRIOR TO THE SCHEDULED PICKUP. Please note the dates for placement of the materials in the street accordingly. It is the responsibility of the resident to notify their landscapers of the rules, restrictions and regulations for each program.

SPRING LEAF PICK UP

All Quadrants March 29th to April 2nd

Leaves **must** be put out at the curb Monday morning by 7:00 a.m. on March 29th. Loose leaves must be placed in neat windrows for pick up. Leaf piles containing branches or any other materials will NOT be picked up.

Leaves may not be placed in the street prior to March 22nd for the spring pickup. Gum balls may be put out with the leaf program. Any bagged leaves held during the winter months must be removed from the bags **prior** to placement at the street.

BRUSH PROGRAMS

*NE & NW Quadrants First Monday in June(7th), September (6th) & January (3rd, 2011)
(Monday, September 6th is a holiday for Public Works. Brush pickup will begin on September 7th)
SE & SW Quadrants Second Monday in June(14th), September (13th) & January (10th, 2011)*

SPRING BRUSH PICK UP (A post winter cleanup of branches, brush and stumps)

*NE & NW Quadrants April 5th
SE & SW Quadrants April 12th*

This program is for BRANCHES, ONLY! No other material will be picked up. Materials should be placed curbside by 7:00 a.m. on Monday on the dates listed above. Each resident will receive one (1) brush pickup during there scheduled weeks listed above. Brush shall not exceed 6' in length and may not exceed 12" in diameter. Mulch is available to Fanwood residents at the recycling center. Brush and branches should not block or obstruct roadways and sidewalks. Leaves are NOT permitted in the Brush program. **Brush may not be placed in the street seven (7) days prior to the above dates.**

CHRISTMAS TREE PICKUP

All Quadrants January 3rd to January 31st

Christmas Trees will be picked up during the January pickup and throughout the month until January 29th. Christmas trees for the final pick-up must be placed at the curb by 7:00 AM on January 29th. WREATHS OR GARLANDS are not acceptable for pickup.

GRASS CLIPPINGS

Grass clippings provide beneficial nutrients to gardens and lawns reducing the need for fertilizers and contributing to the soils organic matter. It is recommended to mow your grass with a mulching mower, when done properly, you are left with neat, "just vacuumed" appearance. And thatch is not a problem incurred with mulching mowers, a common misconception. Thatch is the result of excess surface roots caused by over watering and over fertilizing. If you do not own a mulching mower, simply use the clippings as a garden mulch, spreading it on the surface to help eliminate weed growth, reduce soil spattering and crusting and also to help moderate the soil temperature.

If you choose to not mulch your grass, it is the responsibility of the residents to contract with their private garbage hauler or scavenger to dispose of grass clippings. **The Borough does not provide pickup of grass clippings therefore placing grass in the street is prohibited. Do not mix grass with brush and/or leaves.**

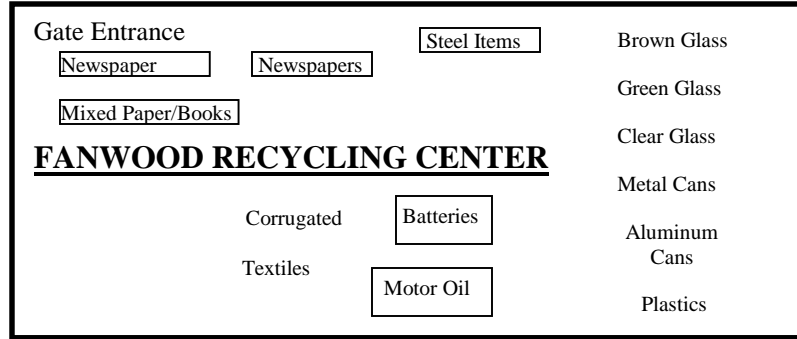
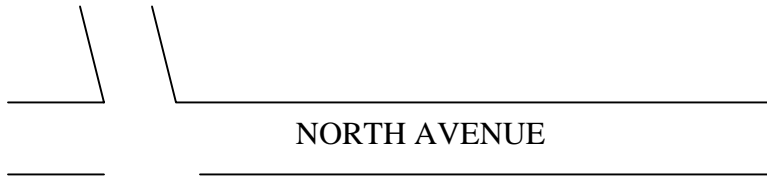
Bulk waste pickup requires a \$65.00 permit fee for a one time and one time only pickup not to exceed 750 lbs. of material. See Page 7 for details and permit application. Hazardous waste (i.e. paints, solvents, thinners, petroleum products, batteries, televisions, computer equipment/monitors etc., are unacceptable for cleanup (See "Union County household special waste collection days" on Pg. 12). Materials shall not obstruct roadway or sidewalks.

FALL LEAF PICK UP PROGRAM

October 18th – December 6th

Leaves will be picked up loose at the curb. Residents should NOT bag their leaves. Leaves should be placed in neat windrows a minimum of 10' from all drainage inlets. Keep rocks, sticks, etc. out of the leaf piles. **Leaf piles with branches or other materials in them will not be picked up.** Please do not park your vehicles within 20' of the leaf piles. This will help the Department pickup the leaves more effectively and efficiently. All leaves for the final pickup must be at curbside by 7:00 a.m. on the last day of scheduled pickups. **Leaves may not be placed in the street prior to October 11th for the fall pickup.** Leaves **must** be out at the curb Monday morning by 7:00 a.m. on December 6th for the final pickup. Leaves accumulated after December 6th must be stored on the resident's property until the spring leaf pickup. This will keep the leaves off the street in preparation of inclement weather so the Department of Public Works may effectively plow the streets curb to curb.

FANWOOD-SCOTCH PLAINS RECYCLING ASSOCIATION RULES FOR RECYCLING

The Fanwood-Scotch Plains Recycling Association is a non-profit organization made up of individuals and local service groups working to alleviate the solid waste disposal problem in New Jersey and save the residents of Fanwood tax dollars. Recovering aluminum, glass, plastics, tin/steel cans, waste oil, clothing, newspaper, mixed paper, magazine, junk mail, books, phone books, cardboard and household batteries.

REMEMBER, RECYCLING IS THE LAW!

The following materials will be accepted at the Fanwood Recycling Center on North Avenue:

NEWSPAPER

Tie with string/twine in manageable bundles no higher than 10”.

GLASS

Rinse and separate food and beverage glass into green, brown, and clear. You do not need to remove labels. ALL metal caps and rings, plastic, lead or metal sleeves on wine bottles, MUST be removed from wine bottles. **NOTE: Plate glass and light bulbs are NOT accepted.**

ALUMINUM

The recycling center will accept all Aluminum products. Pull tabs, seamless, rounded bottom cans formed in one piece tend to be made of aluminum. The center will also accept clean frozen food trays, pie tins, aluminum foil, in addition to heavy aluminum items such as pots, pans, doors, window frames (without glass) gutters and down spouts. **NOTE: Heavy aluminum items may NOT be commingled with aluminum cans and must be placed in the designated area.**

OIL

Residents must pour into the waste oil tank at the center. Do NOT leave your containers. **Antifreeze is NOT accepted.**

PLASTICS

Only pourable containers with the numbers 1, 2 or 3 on the bottom will be accepted. **Plastic chairs/tables, buckets (donation requested); compact discs/DVD's and shopping bags may also be accepted at the center. #4, #5, 6 & # 7 plastics are not acceptable for disposal.**

ELECTRONICS

Televisions, computers, monitors, VCR's, Stereo equipment etc (*a donation is requested for the disposal of these items*).

CLOTHING AND TEXTILES

All clean clothing, nylon curtains, drapes, towels, sheets, hats, belts, paired socks and shoes tied together. **UNACCEPTABLE: wet clothing, pillows, rugs, plastic, foam backed drapes.**

BATTERIES

Car batteries only are accepted. See Page 6 for details regarding proper disposal of all other batteries.

MIXED PAPER/BOOKS

Telephone books, office paper, computer paper, junk mail, magazines, brochures, catalogs. Paper materials may be brought in paper shopping bags – no plastic bags. Soft and hard cover books, including encyclopedias and textbooks.

CORRUGATED CARDBOARD – Boxes should be cut and flattened, as is feasible. **This item includes brown paper shopping bags, cardboard food packaging etc.**

METAL CANS – must be rinsed thoroughly.

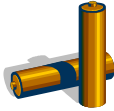
PAINT CANS – water base (latex) paint **ONLY**...paint must be fully absorbed with either cat litter or shredded paper, emptied and completely dried out... leave lid off. Oil based paint is considered **Hazardous Waste** – for proper disposal see **“HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE EVENTS”** on Page 12.

STEEL – small items such as cans, wire hangers, etc. may be brought to the center. Larger items such as refrigerators, washers, dryers, hot water heaters, air conditioning units and microwaves are also accepted at the center. (A donation is requested for the disposal of these items).

OLD AMERICAN FLAGS – these will be recycled respectfully by the American Legion.

COMPUTER INKJETS, LASER AND TONER CARTRIDGES – original boxes are appreciated.

All materials must be at curbside by 7:00 a.m. on Monday of the week designated for your section, but no later than three (3) days before the designated collection date. The following items are **NOT** acceptable which includes similar types of items included in the materials set at the curb for collection.

- *Recyclable Materials that can be taken to the Recycling Center (see 2010 annual D.P.W. Schedule-Page 5)*
- *Building or Construction Materials*
- *Natural Growth Items (leaves, firewood, branches, clippings)*
- *Hazardous Waste (paints, solvents, thinners, petroleum products, batteries, televisions, computer equipment/monitors, etc.)*
- *Flammable Explosive Waste*
- *Motor Vehicle Components*
- *Regular Household Garbage*

There is a weight limitation of 750 lbs. of materials. Any unauthorized material that exceeds the weight limitation as determined by designated officials will be left at the curb and must be removed by the end of the collection day.

**NOTE: STICKER MUST BE PLACED ON MOST VISIBLE ITEM AT THE CURB
 PLACARD (8 1/2 X 11) MUST BE DISPLAYED IN FRONT WINDOW AND BE VISIBLE FROM THE STREET

RESIDENTAL GUIDELINES FOR PUBLIC WORKS SERVICES

SNOW REMOVAL GUIDELINES

Per Borough Ordinance: SIDEWALKS MUST BE SHOVELED WITHIN 12 HOURS OF A SNOWSTORM. ALL CARS MUST BE REMOVED FROM THE STREETS WHEN SNOW IS PREDICTED. Residents who live on a dead end street or cul-de-sac should not park in the street or we will be unable to plow. Your taxes pay for these services that cost you more to do when cars are on the streets. Shovel your driveway by the street to the right. The plows will then carry the snow away from your driveway and not into it. Do not shovel or blow snow into the center of the road as this will freeze and create unsafe ice conditions. It is recommended not to shovel the last 10' of your driveway until the storm is finished *and* Public Works has plowed your street from curb to curb.

Basketball hoops (portable or stationary) are NOT permitted within the Borough right-of-way per ordinance 259-25.C. These items prohibit Public Works from effectively plowing the streets curb to curb. In addition, these units obstruct access to the brush and leaf piles during the annual pickup program(s).

SANITARY SEWER

The Borough operates the sanitary system. The Borough is only responsible for the maintenance of the main sewer line. The lateral service connection (between the home and the main sewer line in the street) is the responsibility of the resident. If a backup occurs in your home please call the Department of Public Works during the day, Monday thru Friday at 322-7404 or after hours please contact the Fanwood Police Department at 322-5000. Please contact us first so we can determine where the problem exists to avoid any unnecessary plumbing costs to you.

RODENT PREVENTION MEASURES FACT SHEET

The following measures can help you avoid rodent problems:

1. Clean up your yard and driveway of all debris, cut high grass and weeds. Eliminate possible rat harborage areas under porches, outside staircases and around shed foundations by using fencing or blocking openings where possible. Note a rat borrow is a hole approximately the size of a baseball.
2. Place all garbage in metal or plastic containers with tight fitting lids. Use adequate sized garbage containers to prevent overloading and spillage of garbage onto the ground.
3. Pile all wood or other material stored outside into closely packed units at least six (6) inches off the ground.
4. Food for birds should be placed on a platform at least four feet from the ground and be constructed to eliminate food from spilling to the ground. Throwing pieces of bread, crackers, and food scraps directly on to the ground encourages rats to harbor on your property.
5. Gardens should be fenced with small meshed wire and maintained on a regular basis. Remove any fruit that has fallen from trees on a daily basis.
6. Animal feces must be cleaned up on a regular basis.

Solutions to Stormwater Pollution

Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water

A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.



As a resident, business, or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides

- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- Look into alternatives for pesticides.
- Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer.
- If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it.



Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze, and paints.
- Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated.

- If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.

- Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.

- Recycle used motor oil.

- Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous-waste disposal facilities.



Keep pollution out of storm drains

- Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local waterbodies.

- Do not let sewage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system.

Clean up after your pet

- Many municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet-waste rules.

- An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.

- Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law. And remember to:

- Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes.

- Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet.

- Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.

Don't feed wildlife

- Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.

- Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.



Don't litter

- Place litter in trash receptacles.

- Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.

- Participate in community cleanups.

Dispose of yard waste properly

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.

- If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them.

- Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.

- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.

SATURDAY, March 27, 2010 - LUCENT TECHNOLOGIES, NEW PROVIDENCE – From ROUTE 22 WEST:

Traveling West into Scotch Plains take Exit for Scotch Plains, Fanwood, Berkeley Heights & New Providence/Route 78 (2nd right after McDonalds, before Blue Star Shopping Center). At 1st light, turn onto New Providence/Diamond Hill Road... Continue straight for 3 lights. At 3rd light, make a right. Alcatel-Lucent is the 1st light on the right... **OR**
From ROUTE 22 EAST – Traveling East into Scotch Plains take Exit for Scotch Plains, Fanwood, Berkeley Heights & New Providence/Route 78 (immediately past Snuffy's). Make first right crossing over Route 22. At the light, follow signs for New Providence continuing straight onto New Providence/Diamond Hill Rd. Continue straight for 3 lights. At the 3rd light, make a right. Lucent is the 1st light on the right.

SATURDAY, May 15, 2010 –UNION COUNTY COLLEGE, CRANFORD

Take the Garden State Parkway to Exit 137. At the exit ramp, bear right onto Westfield Ave. (Route 28) which becomes North Ave. Continue on North Avenue to Centennial Avenue. Just past second light make a right onto Springfield Avenue. Union County College is ¾ mile on the left. Make a left into main parking lot and proceed to BACK parking lot...**OR**

From ROUTE 22 (East or West) – to Cranford/Westfield Exit (Springfield Avenue). Proceed towards Cranford. At fourth light, turn right onto Springfield Avenue. College is two blocks down on right hand side. Make a right into main parking lot and proceed to BACK parking lot.

Pet Waste Pollutes Our Waters

What You Can Do To Help Protect Our Water

Clean and plentiful water is important to our families, our environment, our economy and our quality of life.

Did you know that animal waste from pets can pollute our waters? When left on the ground, pet waste is washed by rain and melting snow and ice into storm drains that carry it to our rivers, lakes, the ocean and drinking water.

Animal waste contains a high concentration of nutrients as well as bacteria and disease-causing microorganisms that can cause problems.

What you can do

Pet owners or anyone who takes your pet for walks must properly dispose of the waste by picking it up, wrapping it and either placing it in the trash or flushing it unwrapped down the toilet.

Your municipality is required to adopt and enforce local pet-waste laws. At a minimum, your community must require that pet owners or their keepers **immediately** and **properly** dispose of their pet's solid waste deposited on **any public or private property not owned or possessed by that person**. People with assistance animals such as Seeing Eye dogs are exempt.

Make sure you know what your municipality requires – and follow it.
